--7:30 Our Speaker tonight is Dr Cameron Jack from UF Bee College. He will speak on his latest study on The Nontarget Impacts of Mosquito Control; Insecticides and Adulticides on FL Bees With assistance from Lena Barasco and Devin Rowen from UF Lab.

Part I Mosquito control is important for the economy and health of citizens and animals in FL Insecticides are necessary and are usually delivered by truck or areal method. Both can impact Bees. They have 6 sets of hives located primarily in the St Augustine area near spraying areas and in rural areas to test the chemical effect of insecticide.

They checked the chemical residue in the hives, and the effects on adult bees and larvae. They inspected all 30 NUCS before deploying them for beehive chemicals. 3 months later they checked again for Chlorpyrifos, the only chemical found heavily in the wax and pollen.

Part II They determine that the impact of Mosquito control was no real difference between the control and the treated sites, even on the Bearding bees. There were no effects of spray on bees or larvae. Part III They next checked Mosquito control on larvae in vitro. They gave pesticides to lab created larvae by putting it in food.

Part IV: They checked the impact of Mosquito adulticides and bees (Nalad) was the chemical proven to be very toxic toto bees if taken orally. CONCLUSION is active ingredients are more toxic to bees if formulated in sprays except 'duet (2 chemicals mixed) it was more toxic to adult bees than larvae.

The chemicals used for Mosquito control do not seem to hurt bees. Conclusion:

- 1. Temporarily cover your bees and move them away from the road when they are spraying.
- 2. Communicate with Mosquito Control
- 3. Do your research and keep track of any problems, esp dead bees after spraying episode.
- 4. If you think spraying damaged your bees< James Fulton runs the lab at UF and can analyze what killed your bees. It may take months for the results.
